

Tres Leches

Hailing from Mexico, Tres Leches is a fixture in all Latin-American cuisines. It is a spongy, light cake soaked in an ultra-sweet mixture. Tres leches means three milk, which shocker are the main ingredients in this dish. Happy baking folks!

Ingredients:

1.5 Cups all-purpose flour

1 teaspoon of baking powder

0.5 cup butter

1 cup sugar

14 ounces of sweetened condensed milk

2 cups whole milk

12 ounces of evaporated milk

1.5 cups whipping cream

1 cup white sugar

1 teaspoon vanilla extract

Instructions:

Preheat oven to 350 degrees Fahrenheit

Grease and flour your baking pan

Sift flour and baking powder together in a separate bowl; set aside

Beat 1 cup of sugar and butter together in a large bowl until it is light and fluffy. After this add the vanilla and eggs.

Add the flour mixture to the butter mixture



until it is fully blended.

Put the blended mix into the cake pan, and place in the oven to bake.

To ensure that the cake is fully baked, insert a toothpick in the center and check if it comes out clean. This should take approximately 30 minutes.

Pierce the cake with a fork and leave to cool.

Mix the whole milk, evaporated milk, and condensed milk in a separate bowl

Pour this mixture over the cake after it has cooled. Allow the milk to soak into the cake.

Whip the cream and the 1 cup of sugar in a chilled glass until thick.

Spread the cream over the cake.

Keep the cake refrigerated until serving.

Canadian students are embracing AI, with over half (52%) using generative AI tools like chatbots and writing assistants for their schoolwork, according to a recent Klynveld Peat Marwick Goerdeler (KPMG) survey. While 60% of students using AI feel it's cheating, many claim it to be a shortcut to good grades. However, many agree that blindly trusting AI-generated content can lead to factual errors and plagiarism. The survey also revealed a gap in awareness: only 38% of students knew their school's policy on AI use. Schools can help by teaching students to evaluate AI and develop ethical writing skills.
